(a nonprofit organization), which comprise the statement of financial position as of December 31, 2024, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Ronald McDonald House Charities of South Louisiana, Inc. as of December 31, 2024, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

NATURE OF OPERATIONS

Ronald McDonald House Charities of South Louisiana, Inc. ("House") was created in 1983. It is a nonprofit organization which provides a "home-away-from-home" to families of seriously ill children and provides programs that give comfort, compassion, and care to children and their families. The House serves critically ill children through our Ronald McDonald House on the campus of Manning Family Children's Hospital New Orleans, Lafayette Ronald McDonald Family Room at Our Lady of Lourdes Women's & Children's Hospital, and Hospitality Carts. Through these programs the House helps provide housing, meals, transportation, community, and psychosocial support to families with children at local hospitals.

1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

Basis of Accounting:

The financial statements have been prepared using the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis of Presentation:

Net assets and revenues, expenses, gains, and losses are classified based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. Accordingly, net assets of the House and changes therein are classified as follows:

- <u>Net Assets Without Donor Restrictions</u> Net assets that are not subject to donorimposed restrictions and may be expended for any purpose in performing the primary objections of the organization. These net assets may be used at the discretion of the House's management and the board of directors.
- <u>Net Assets With Donor Restrictions</u> Net assets subject to stipulations imposed by donors and grantors. Some donor restrictions are temporary in nature; those restrictions will be met by actions of the House or by the passage of time. Other donor restrictions are perpetual in nature, whereby the donor has stipulated the funds be maintained in perpetuity. Net assets with donor restrictions totaled \$2,393,822 at December 31, 2024.

Donor restricted contributions are reported as increases in net assets with donor restrictions. When a restriction expires, net assets are reclassified from net assets with donor restrictions to net assets without donor restrictions in the statement of activities and changes in net assets.

1. <u>SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES</u>: (Continued)

Use of Estimates:

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported in the financial statements and accompanying notes. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Cash and Cash Equivalents:

Cash equivalents consist of highly liquid investments with original maturities less than three months from the statement of financial position date.

Investments:

Investments are recorded at fair market value. Gains and losses on investments are reported as increases and decreases in net assets without donor restrictions unless the use is restricted by explicit donor stipulation or law.

Accounts Receivable:

Accounts receivable is stated at unpaid balances. Management believes all accounts receivable are collectible, and therefore, there is no allowance for credit losses.

It is the House's policy to charge off uncollectible receivables when management determines the receivable will not be collected. There were no accounts receivable charged off during the year.

Due from Related Party:

Amounts due from related party represent grants and contributions due from Ronald McDonald House Charities, Inc. Global.

Unconditional Promises to Give:

Unconditional promises to give that are expected to be collected within one year are recorded at their net realizable value. Unconditional promises to give that are expected to be collected in future years are recorded at the present value of their net realizable value. The discounts on those amounts are computed using a discount rate applicable to the year in which the promise to give is received. Subsequent amortization of the discount is included in contribution revenue. Management expects the promises to give to be collectible; therefore, no allowance was recorded.

1. <u>SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES</u>: (Continued)

Revenue Recognition: (Continued)

Contributions consist of grants and gifts from individuals, corporations, foundations, and Ronald McDonald House Charities, Inc. Global. The House also receives reimbursements from a medical center for the family room expenses. During 2024, the House began receiving reimbursements from Medicaid to assist with the family lodging and meals while visiting.

Contributions or pledges from donors that are in substance unconditional, are recognized by the House as net assets without donor restrictions. All donor-stipulated contributions are reported as net assets with donor restrictions depending on the nature of the stipulations. When a restriction expires (that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished), net assets with donor restrictions are classified to net assets without donor restrictions and are reported in the statement of activities and changes in net assets as net assets released from restrictions.

The House also hosts fundraising events. There are no restrictions from this support, and the funds are used for the House's primary activities and general operations.

Contributed Services:

The House records non-cash donations as contributions at their estimated fair values at the date of donation. The House recognizes donated services, if significant in amount, which create or enhance nonfinancial assets or that require specialized skills that are provided by individuals possessing those skills and would typically need to be purchased if not provided by donation. In-kind contributions consisting of both time and resources for the year ended December 31, 2024 were \$240,924.

Property and Equipment:

Property and equipment are recorded at cost and depreciated using the straight-line method over the useful lives of the assets, which range as follows:

Expenditures for major additions of property and equipment in excess of \$1,000 whose useful lives extend beyond a one-year period and betterments which naturally add to the value of related assets or materially extend the useful lives of assets are capitalized. Donated assets are recognized at their estimated fair values at the date of donation. Expenditures for maintenance and repairs are charged to expense as incurred.

1. <u>SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES</u>: (Continued)

Functional Expense Allocation:

The costs of providing the various programs and other activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of activities. The statement of functional expenses presents the natural classification detail of expenses by function. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the program and supporting services benefited and fundraising. These allocations are based on estimates determined by management. Management and general expenses include those expenses that are not directly identifiable with any other specific function but provide for the overall support and direction of the House.

Net Assets With Donor Restrictions:

Net assets with donor restrictions are primarily composed of proceeds from the sale of donated stock. The donor specifically stipulated that only the dividends and earnings received from the investment may be used to fund operations and was setup as a perpetual endowment.

Income Taxes:

The House is exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Accordingly, no provision has been made for income taxes.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require management to evaluate tax positions taken by the House and recognize a tax liability if the House has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would be sustained upon examination by the IRS or other applicable taxing authorities. Management has analyzed the tax positions taken by the House and has determined that as of December 31, 2024, there were no material uncertain tax positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability or disclosure in the financial statements.

The House's forms 990 for 2023, 2022, and 2021 are subject to examination by the IRS, generally for three years after they were filed. The House does not believe that the results from any examination of these open years would have a material adverse effect on the House.

Advertising:

The House expenses advertising costs when incurred. Advertising expense for the year ended December 31, 2024 was \$1,519.

2. BOARD-DESIGNATED NET ASSETS:

The House has designated net assets for program expansion, property and equipment, and general house operations. Designated net assets totaled \$6,743,574 at December 31, 2024.

3. PROPERTY AND EQUIPMENT:

Depreciation expense for the year ended December 31, 2024 was \$162,293.

4. <u>CONCENTRATIONS</u>:

The House maintains its cash in bank deposit accounts which typically exceed federally insured limits as guaranteed by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) up to \$250,000. As of December 31, 2024, the House's cash exceeded the FDIC insurance by \$25,302.

The House receives substantially all of its income from grants and contributions, fundraising events, and donations from individuals and businesses located primarily in the New Orleans area. Any significant decrease in these donations could negatively impact the House's operations.

For the year ended December 31, 2024, three donors accounted for approximately 18% of contributions, which includes donations from individuals, corporations and fundraising events held by the House.

5. <u>LIQUIDITY AND AVAILABILITY OF FINANCIAL ASSETS</u>:

The House manages its liquidity by operating within a prudent range of financial stability, maintaining adequate liquidity to fund near-term operations, and maintaining sufficient reserves to provide reasonable assurance that any long-term obligations will be discharged. As part of the House's liquidity management plan, cash in excess of daily requirements is invested in short-term investments and money market accounts. The following table reflects the House's financial assets as of December 31, 2024, reduced by amounts not available for expenses within one year of the statement of financial position:

6. FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS:

U.S. GAAP defines fair value and establishes a framework for measuring fair value that includes a hierarchy that categorizes and prioritizes the sources used to measure and disclose fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date.

The fair value hierarchy is broken down into three levels of inputs that market participants would use in valuing the asset or liability, which can be summarized as follows:

- <u>Level 1</u>: Quoted prices (unadjusted) for identical assets or liabilities in active markets.
- <u>Level 2</u>: Significant other observable inputs other than Level 1 prices, such as quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities, quoted prices in markets that are not active; and other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data.

6. FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS: (Continued)

<u>Level 3</u>: Valuation based on inputs that are unobservable, therefore requiring management's own assumptions about the assumptions that market participants would use in pricing an asset or liability

7. RELATED PARTIES:

Ronald McDonald House Charities, Inc. (RMHC Global) provides ongoing program grants to all of its chapters around the world. These program grants are preauthorized by the board of RMHC Global for the benefit of all chapters. The grants are available to all chapters that meet the program parameters; as such, the individual grants do not require any additional board action. During the year ended December 31, 2024, the House received \$2,000 in grants from RMHC Global.

RHMC Global collects contributions through various programs on behalf of the chapters around the world. During the year ended December 31, 2024, the House received \$986,314 from RMHC Global for contributions collected on their behalf.

8. ENDOWMENT FUND:

The House's endowment fund consists of proceeds received from the sale of McDonald's stock. As required by generally accepted accounting principles, net assets associated with endowment funds are classified and reported based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions.

8. <u>ENDOWMENT FUND</u>: (Continued)

The Board of Directors of the House has interpreted the State Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (SPMIFA) as requiring the preservation of the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date of the donor-restricted endowment funds absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. As a result of this interpretation, the House classifies as net assets with donor restrictions (a) the original value of gifts donated to the perpetual endowment, (b) the original value of subsequent gifts to the perpetual endowment, and (c) accumulations to the perpetual endowment made in accordance with the direction of the applicable donor gift instrument at the time the accumulation is added to the fund. In accordance with SPMIFA, the House considers the following factors in making a determination to appropriate or accumulate donor-restricted endowment funds: (1) the duration and preservation of the various funds, (2) the purposes of the donor-restricted endowment funds, (3) general economic conditions, (4) the possible effect of inflation and deflation, (5) the expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments, (6) other resources of the House, and (7) the House's investment policies.

Investment Return Objectives, Risk Parameters and Strategies. The House has adopted investment and spending policies, approved by the Board of Directors, for endowment assets that attempt to provide a predictable stream of funding to programs supported by its endowment funds while also maintaining the purchasing power of those endowment assets over the long-term. Actual returns in any given year may vary from this amount.

To satisfy its long-term rate-of-return objectives, the House relies on a total return strategy in which investment returns are achieved through both capital appreciation (realized and unrealized) and current yield (interest and dividends). From time to time, the House updates the investment policy to target a diversified asset allocation that can achieve its long-term objectives within prudent risk constraints.

Spending Policy. Only income earned from the fund may be used for House operations.

9. IN-KIND CONTRIBUTIONS:

Services recognized represent time volunteers spend on cooking meals or providing assistance with various tasks, such as covering the front desk. The House also tracks board members' hours in meetings and committees. Services are recognized at fair value as determined by the donors on the date of the contribution. Supplies are donated items, including food, new toys and household supplies. Supplies were valued at actual cost.

The House used all of these contributed goods and services during the fiscal year for its own program or supporting services activities. No in-kind contributions were restricted. In-kind contributions (non-cash) are offset by like amounts included in the statement of activities and statement of functional expenses.

10. PROMISES TO GIVE:

During the year ended December 31, 2021, the House waged a capital campaign to obtain funds for construction costs of the new building at Manning Family Children's Hospital. The promises to give are recorded as receivables and revenue when received. The money received from these promises to give will be used to assist with construction costs per the agreement with Manning Family Children's Hospital.

Promises to give with due dates extending beyond one year are discounted using Treasury bill rates for similar term investments. The applicable rate when the promises to give were recognized was 3.99%. In subsequent years, amortization of the discount is reported in the Statement of Activities as contribution revenue.

As of December 31, 2024, approximately \$109,624 of the unconditional promises to give were due from board members.

11. <u>NOTE PAYABLE</u>:

In November 2020, the House entered into a lease agreement with Manning Family Children's Hospital for use of the newly renovated building. The lease requires payments of \$1 a year for ninety-nine years. Payments are due on the first day of each lease year and can be paid in one lump sum at any time during the lease period.

As part of the lease agreement, the House signed an agreement with Manning Family Children's Hospital in which the House agrees to pay a share of the construction costs on the leased building. The total amount to be paid is the lesser amount of 50% of total costs or \$3,000,000. The House agreed to pay \$3,000,000 over seven installments. Per the terms of the agreement, if the final construction costs incurred are less than \$6,000,000, the House will receive a 50% credit of the difference between \$6,000,000 and the final cost expended on the project. The House made an initial payment of \$500,000 (due before commencement of the project) on December 2, 2021. The note is non-interest bearing, unless the House does not make an annual installment when due. At that point, interest will be charged at a rate of 12% or the highest rate allowed by law, whichever is less, from the date on which the installment is due, until paid in full. The note balance at December 31, 2024, was \$2,000,000.
